

GAYATRI DEVI MD, MS, FACP, FAAN

Dr. Devi's entire career is focused on promoting brain health. She established her premier center for neurological wellness, education, and research in 1999. She is board-certified in Neurology, Pain Medicine, Psychiatry, Brain Injury Medicine, and Behavioral Neurology.

Widely published, Dr. Devi is an Attending Physician at Lenox Hill Hospital, and a Clinical Professor of Neurology and Psychiatry at the Zucker School of Medicine | Northwell Health. She redefined Alzheimer's Disease as a spectrum disorder, established clinical criteria for menopause-related cognitive impairment, and pioneered the use of transcranial magnetic stimulation for cognitive disorders. Her approach to individualizing Alzheimer's diagnosis and treatment was featured in the *New England Journal of Medicine*.

Key prior roles include Clinical Associate Professor of Neurology and Psychiatry at NYU, Assistant Professor of Neurology at Columbia University, Clinical Core Co-director of the Taub Alzheimer's Disease Research Center at Columbia, President of the American Medical Women's Association, and President of the National Council on Women's Health.

Dr. Devi believes in a compassionate, patient-centered approach to promote brain health and was recognized as an Innovator in Health Care by CaringKind. She received the Presidential Award from the American Medical Women's Association, was honored as a Distinguished Visiting Professor at Weill Cornell Medical College, and is consistently listed as a Super Doctor and a Castle Connolly Top Doctor. Featured on the BBC, CBS, The New York Times, NPR, TIME, and The Wall Street Journal. Dr. Devi has authored several books, most recently "Spectrum of Hope: An Optimistic and New Approach to Alzheimer's Disease."

Dr. Devi serves as Neurological Consultant to the NYS Committee on Physician Health and sits on the Board of Directors of CaringKind, the heart of Alzheimer's Caregiving, and Columbia University's School of Professional Studies. She is particularly proud of founding and running the "Girls Get Healthy" program at the National Council on Women's Health at Weill Cornell for a decade, providing for-credit essential health and sex education classes to over 1,100 inner-city schoolgirls annually.

Dr. Devi loves New York City, her home of over thirty years, the Met Opera, and the Yankees. A Trustee of NYC's Central Park, she is very proud of her daughter Virginia, a surgeon.
